

Pastor's Report 2021

Often in life, it is difficult not to experience God as Holy Mystery. Sitting down to write, I looked back at what I shared with you last year. My 2020 Pastor's Report ended with:

"Beloved, the year ahead will undoubtedly bring new challenges, and unanticipated joys. May we continue following that Spirit which leads us in God's love to reach out in ever-widening circles..."

There you have it—2021 summed up succinctly! We could not have imagined the many twists and turns which lay ahead. We have needed to be resilient, adaptive, flexible, creative, and offer one another grace. Change is hard, especially rapid change. The realities around us cause feelings such as anxiety and frustration to emerge. And Beloved, we have experienced *a lot* of change the past year!



This is why I love the Great Hope which encircles us each time we enter the church building. Etched in the cornerstone out front is a reminder we are a congregation who continually sees God's New Thing. Out back is the maple tree which was planted in the spring in celebration of what we imagined would be our return to the physical sanctuary at the end of the 2020 pandemic. The children of Memorial UCC voted to call the memorial tree New Beginnings. What an appropriate name!



I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? Isaiah 43:19, NRSV

The trouble is, God's idea of a New Thing often catches us by surprise. Susan Beaumont writes, "Abraham, Sarah, Jacob, and Job each have a liminal tale to tell. Each biblical journey is a venturing

forth: an ending, followed by a disorienting season of transitions, and finally a reorientation to something new that is substantially different from what was left behind. Clearly, God works with liminality. Through liminal experiences human beings are transformed and brought into deeper relationship with God."¹

We have been gifted with the rare opportunity to live in a liminal time, an in-between space. A moment to build a deeper relationship with God and with each other. Every ending carries a sense of loss, but also a turning towards that New Thing God intends for us. Indeed, 2021 was filled with turning points. The first 6 months we worshiped virtually. Then on Sunday, June 13, we celebrated as we moved back into the church building. This provided us with the opportunity for blended in-person

and online services. Since then, our sanctuary has expanded and shifted as local health and safety needs changed. Through it all we have reimagined what worshiping God can look like:

- Over the summer, we embraced the idea of an expanded sanctuary. One which simultaneously happened inside the building, out in the Bible Garden, and online. Some of you joined us on your smart phones from a bike trail, horse barn, or a parked car. During those months, attendance reflected a fairly even split between each sacred space for worship.
- In the fall, change came in the form of cooler weather, and a vaccine which became available for youth over the age of 12. Each Sunday approximately 1/3 of our faith community gathered to worship in-person. The other 2/3 of continued worshiping online. We welcomed Pastoral Intern Christina Schoenwetter to learn and grow with us as we explored what being a hybrid congregation means for us as followers of Jesus.
- December brought SINGING and the return of treasured activities! We joyfully began to sing one hymn at the end of each service while continuing to wear masks. The Craft and Cookie Sale returned. The choir got together on a Thursday night to sing in-person for the first time in nearly 2 years. The youth group met for a movie night, and families got crafty making gifts in the Fellowship Hall during Nifty Gifty. Arbor Covenant Church joined us for 2 special worship services, the Longest Night and Christmas Eve. So much was springing forth and then...
- The end of the year brought the next unexpected move. We joined other UCC congregations in the Madison area in shifting to virtual worship on December 26. The United Church of Christ's 3 Great Loves includes the love of creation, love of children, and love of neighbor. The decision to flow back to online services, Bible study, and other congregational activities was for the health and wellness of each and every one of you—and our community. Currently, there is an all too real parallel between the birth of Jesus and no room at the inn... and no room in our local hospitals. It is with these Great Loves in mind that our lay leaders continue to demonstrate the commitment to making difficult decisions. I give thanks for the Church Council, committee members, and staff who have committed so much of their time creatively adapting EVERYTHING we do as Church the past 2 years.

Friends, we are resilient, and we KNOW how to be flexible, show grace to one another, and continue Being the Church! Our 104-year history as a congregation have provided us with fertile ground upon which to root our covenant with one another in God's all-inclusive love. Take a moment to reread our Mission Statement. In what ways do you think is God planting a New Thing in our midst for in 2022? The words healing, reconciling, and nurturing jump out for me. This is what the world needs now. It is what **we** need now.

Council President's Report 2021

2021 was a year of frustration, resilience, and achievement.

Covid continued to frustrate us. We worked to bring things back to "normal". Then the Delta strain set us back. Rebecca Malke kept our Faith Development going despite the restrictions needed to keep our kids safe. We found ways to have Vacation Bible School and grow a Bible Garden.

Jamie Gaffke kept the office running smoothly, no matter what changes she had to deal with.

You, as members of the Memorial U.C.C. Congregation did more than just support the staff in all of the changes needed to keep going. Together you achieved new things. You undertook to support Black Women's Wellness for five years and you exceeded your first-year objectives. You conducted a major capital campaign to replace the crumbling driveway. Not exactly a glamorous project, but you surpassed your fundraising goal, and the driveway will be replaced in 2022. You began a major initiative to support Planet Earth through the new Green Team and you changed your personal lifestyles by using better products in your everyday lives.

You did all this while still supporting Luke House, the Personal Essentials Pantry, Bright Stars of Bethlehem, Music Makers, and all the other ways you show God's love in a difficult world.

Faith Development Report 2021



Children's Faith Development

At the start of the year, I used the children's message as a time to teach a Sunday school lesson. Additional materials were emailed to families each week, as well. A YouTube channel was created for people to watch the lesson if they missed it during the worship service. In the fall, with in-person Sunday school being delayed until January 2022, families were given a bag filled with ageappropriate activities. The goal was not to give parents additional work but to give them ways to

add a Bible lesson into their daily routine. For example, movie suggestions and discussion guides were given to encourage a home movie night that had a Christian message. Bags also included indoor and outdoor games with a Biblical theme and recipes with lessons to encourage everyone to join in dinner preparations and conversation.

Vacation Bible School

It was very exciting to see the VBS program return this summer. Our VBS director, Jann Veloff, along with the VBS music leader, Lynn Hilgers provided a weeklong of fun for 14 children and youth. Under a big tent there were plenty of outdoor games, activities, and storytelling.



Youth Group

We now have a youth group for those grades 7th-9th. We hope that as we connect, we can expand to include older youth. Seven youth gathered in September to talk about what they wanted their group to look like and what kinds of activities they wanted to do together. In October we gathered to do a corn maze then talked about navigating the "maze of life". In November we gathered for lunch then raked a church members yard for two hours. Our group will have a mix of fun activities, learning and service work.



Adult Faith Development

Covid-19 made it difficult for some of our adult groups to continue. First Friday Fellowship (FFF) and our senior spiritual learning group will begin again once it's safer. The Doctor Who and Theology group, however, continues to thrive and now meets biweekly instead of monthly.

Goals for 2022

We've been away from each other for so long that our main focus for both children and adults is community building. In Sunday school we'll revisit basic information for our younger students, explore parts of the Bible we don't normally talk about, and learn in a more hands-on way through science experiments, cooking and games.

A positive outcome of the pandemic is that we're now well-versed in Zoom. Being able to offer classes both in-person and online allows us to attend classes when we might otherwise be hesitant because of bad weather, too dark to drive at night or we're simply tired because of a busy day and driving to one more place feels overwhelming. Membership Committee 2021

May God make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we abound in love for you." (1 Thess. 3:12, NRSV)

2021 offered us blessings and challenges as we continue to reimagine what our support of a vibrant congregational life can look like. We recognize the importance of supporting the physical, mental health, and spiritual needs of the members and friends of Memorial during these unprecedented days. To that end, we offered a variety of opportunities to build relationships through both in-person and tech ministries. In-person opportunities happened both inside the building and out on the beautiful grounds of the church. Tech ministries include sending cards, emails, and texts; Memorial's Ever-Widening Circles FaceBook page; and picking up the phone to call one another!

Membership Committee's Mission: The Membership Committee coordinates efforts to attract and retain members and friends of Memorial UCC. The work of the Committee is performed in the spirit of evangelism to create a warm, caring, and welcoming environment for people of all ages, races, sexual orientations, gender identities and church backgrounds to participate in the life and ministry of our church. (Memorial UCC's constitution, July 2019)

Congregational Life:

- <u>Fellowship each Sunday morning</u>—January through mid-June, following online worship services, virtual fellowship time was hosted on Zoom. Around 20 people regularly stayed to participate.

 The summer offered us the opportunity to begin offering blended worship. At the time, the Membership Committee coordinated prepackaged snacks and coffee on the patio outside Fellowship Hall. We are continuing to be responsive to the needs of the congregation. We hope to host fellowship inside the building whenever it is safe to do so.
- All Church Activities—Reconnecting with one another will be important as we come back together
 in the months ahead. In 2021, we offered several fun activities such as painting small pumpkins in
 October and Christmas ornaments in December. Pastor Kris has set up office hours in the front
 yard of the church, and at a local dog park. In all the changes, we want to affirm that having FUN
 and embracing JOY are part of who we are!
- <u>Health Resource Nurse</u>—Frances Mozer, LPN, has volunteered to help with medical questions, provide blood pressure checks, and offer other resources to Memorial. She surveyed the congregation to learn more about our needs and interests. This is a wonderful gift for the health and wellness of our community!

- <u>Chariot Ministry</u>—In June, we were able to relaunch the Chariot Ministry. Coordinated by Jeanne Prueher, this ministry supports people who need a ride to church on Sundays. In addition, the Membership Committee is available to help coordinate rides to medical appointments on a caseby-case basis.
- Online Directory—The Membership Committee collaborated with Jamie Gaffke, Church
 Administrator, to launch an online directory. Keeping up a database is always a work in progress.
 The online directory will help us to keep contact information current.
- <u>Card Ministry</u>—Donna Mullaly continues to do an amazing ministry sending cards to members
 and friends of Memorial. The Membership Committee also sends out cards on a regular basis. In
 the fall, Pastor Kris and Rebecca sent nearly 50 cards to the children and teenagers of the church
 as they returned to school. Pastor Kris sent sunflower seeds and cards out to the entire
 congregation as 2021 began, and Christmas cards as the year came to a close.
- Food Ministry—We have paused the Food Ministry during the pandemic.
- <u>Prayer Chain</u>—The prayer chain is hosted on Memorial's Ever-Widening Circles FaceBook page. There are 96 people in the group. Prayers are also included in the weekly eNews.
- Over-80 Brunch—While the brunch has not been hosted since 2019, we have found other ways to connect to those in the congregation who are 80 years of age or older. This year, for those who are homebound, we took Valentine's and Easter flowers to their homes.
- <u>Care packages for college students</u>—In December, during final exams, the Membership Committee arranged to have popcorn tins sent to students.
- <u>First Friday Fellowship</u>—February through May, Donna Mullaly and Rebecca Malke coordinated gatherings on Zoom. The group took a break during the summer and fall. We hope to be able to offer opportunities once again when we are able meet in-person.
- <u>Birthdays</u>—As we continued worshiping online, we were looking for new ways to celebrate YOU! One opportunity has been by recognizing birthdays on the 2nd Sunday of each month during worship.

Visitors, Transitions, and New Member Ministry:

• Two blended (in-person and on Zoom) New Member+ gatherings were hosted in the fall. Pastor Kris is coordinating with those who would like to join the church to find a date in 2022 to welcome new members during worship.

- Visitors have told us they have checked out our worship services on YouTube before attending inperson services. Others have stopped by the church to let us know they have been watching online throughout the pandemic and to say "thank you" for what we are doing.
- We want to acknowledge that the past 2 years has contributed to a lot of change in the life of our beloved church community. Several people have moved into skilled care and/or memory facilities.
 We have grieved as members have moved away to live closer to family. We have heard from others who been stretched by pandemic stressors and have subsequently decided to step back from church at this time.

Personnel Committee 2021

Dean Baumgardner, Terry Hoffman and Cathy Halpin (Chair) continued in their roles throughout 2021.

We held business meetings six times throughout the year to handle behind the scenes background checks, advise on vacation and pastoral coverage and clarify staff roles when needed. Additionally, we met several times to plan, amend and complete Pastor Kris's job review in preparation for setting 2022 goals.

Christina Schoenwetter joined staff as a pastoral intern. Additionally, Frances Mozer added a new role—health resource nurse—to her nursery lead position.

2021 was the first year of implementing longevity pay for staff. Pastor Kris, Rebecca Malke, Jonathan Schroelucke and Jeff Darwin each received a longevity pay increase. Along with Jamie Gaffke, we are so lucky to have them all at Memorial!

Outreach Committee 2021

The Outreach Committee is grateful to Ann Moffat for her many years of dedicated service as chair of Outreach and welcomed Kaitlin Young as the new chair.

The Outreach Committee is responsible for providing focus to the mission of MUCC by identifying needs in the local, national and world community to further MUCC's mission of reaching out in everwidening circles as witnesses to God's all-inclusive love for the lonely, the hungry, and those hurting in body or in spirit. The committee identifies mission opportunities and helps coordinate the many volunteers from our congregation who reach out in service to our community and beyond through such programs as:

- Good Neighbors Personal Essentials Pantry (GNPEP)
- Luke House
- Open Doors for Refugees
- Clothing drives
- CROP Walk
- Prison ministry
- Badger Prairie Needs Network (BPNN)
- Bright Stars of Bethlehem (Christmas Lutheran Church of Bethlehem Partnership)

Outreach is also responsible for coordinating special offerings, including:

- UCC mission programs: One Great Hour of Sharing, Neighbors in Need, Strengthen the Church and Christmas Fund
- Disaster relief
- Foundation for Black Women's Wellness

During 2021, the Outreach Committee distributed financial support through the 2nd Mile and Endowment Funds to support social service organizations. It also coordinated with Pastor Kris to provide direct financial support to people in need through the Ahrnsbrak Family Fund and Pastor's Discretionary Fund.

<u>Giving Locally - Going the Second Mile</u> - Four times a year, members of the congregation use special envelopes to make an extra "second-mile" donation to help fund many of the projects listed below. This year MUCC provided \$2,625 in support to the following organizations.

Other Outreach Efforts

- ◆ In addition to direct financial support, volunteers from MUCC help operate the GNPEP at Arbor Covenant. Further, our congregation donated more than \$1,000 worth of pantry items through the *Product of the Month* program.
- ♦ A new initiative arising out of the *Black Lives Matter* movement raised \$19,425 for the Foundation for Black Women's Wellness in partnership with Arbor Covenant church. This special fund-raising campaign will continue in 2022.
- ♦ Each month more than 30 volunteers from MUCC provide a meal at Luke House for people in need. The group is excited to once again be serving in-person hot meals, since for much of the year 100 sack lunches were provided each month for distribution at the door due to Covid.
- ♦ Jim and Jan Hornik are active in refugee resettlement through Open Doors for Refugees and have inspired others from MUCC to get involved. MUCC's support provided bunkbeds for the children of Afghan families and other refugees coming to make new homes in Dane County. Open Doors is gearing up to assist more than 100 refugee families in 2022.
- ...and let's not forget the Crop Walk. Memorial's team of walkers with the help of the congregation raised \$2,475 to support the Dane County food pantries, as well as address hunger throughout the world.

Memorial UCC is truly blessed by the generosity of our congregation.

Special Events Committee 2021

For 2020 there were no in-person events due to COVID-19. When things get back to normal, we hope to resume Easter Breakfast, the Grill Out, Evenings of Music and other events as they develop.

The Special Events Committee is really an ad-hoc group led by Al Krug. Bill Jetzter and Jackie Neidhardt are the other core members. We have a regular group of volunteers.

Trustee Committee 2021

The Trustees are responsible for the care and custody of church property, including both the financial and physical assets. Significant changes were experienced this year, first we said goodbye to John VanOverbeke, as he and Bonnie moved closer to their daughter in Atlanta. John faithfully served as our Financial Secretary and Accountant for many years. As that door closed, however, a window opened, and we gratefully welcomed Cathy Halpin as the new Financial Secretary and Barb Stransky to fulfil the Accountant duties. Second, after many years of service, Jon Boldebuck stepped down as chair of the Trustees replaced by Dean Baumgardner.

The year was financially challenging, as well, with the church starting out with a deficit budget of more than \$25,000 in large part caused by the Covid pandemic. Generous contributions from the congregation and diligent work by the committees and staff helped cut the deficit in half with the remaining shortfall covered by the 'rainy day' reserves that the Trustees had set aside during better financial times.

Despite the challenges, much was accomplished to prepare for reopening of the building, including new carpeting and other improvements (see the Buildings and Grounds report) and the *Pave the Way Capital Campaign* raised the funds needed to repave the parking lot in 2022. On an ongoing basis, the Trustees perform the following duties:

- Record and deposit weekly contributions,
- Prepare giving statements to members,
- Prepare payroll for staff,
- Pay vendors for services,
- Prepare and review financial reports for Council and the Congregation,
- Prepare and present the operating budget for approval by the Congregation, and
- Manage and invest available funds, including the Endowment Fund, Arhnsbrak Fund, Memorial Funds, 2nd Mile funds and cash reserves.

The Trustees also updated the Endowment Fund Policy and determined that the church no longer needs a safety deposit box and instead secured documents on site in a fire resistant safe, as well as placing electronic copies in cloud storage. The Trustees further updated account access authorizations at all financial institutions used by Memorial UCC.

Building & Grounds Committee & Tech Team 2021

The Building and Grounds Committee is responsible for the physical real estate assets of the church, including the building and surrounding grounds. It is the mission of the committee to plan for the present and future needs of the facilities and to arrange for and oversee the day-to-day maintenance and long-term improvements.

The major project undertaken by the building and Grounds committee this year was the capital appeal to raise \$50,000 to go towards replacement of the parking lot. Thanks to generous donations from the congregation, we were able to raise \$63,315. The Trustees have earmarked an additional \$60,000 from the Major Maintenance Fund and Endowment Fund. The next step is for the congregation to vote on the project at the next annual meeting in January 2022.

Highlights of projects completed by the Tech Team:

- New 70" TV in the sanctuary
- Direct wired the sanctuary TV to the internet to reduce drop offs
- Misc. tweaking/improvements of streaming process in Media room
- New choir microphone
- Window shades approved/ordered to reduce glare in sanctuary
- Increased the internet speed.
- Additional people trained to run Media room currently Jordan, Bill, and John Dipko

Highlights of projects completed by the Build and Grounds Committee:

- Ran a Capital appeal campaign to raise money for replacing the parking lot
- Working with a local civil engineer, secured updated bids for the parking lot replacement
- Held a spring cleanup day for the church grounds
- Replaced the furnace that serves the Sunday school rooms and nursery
- Improved the air filtration in the sanctuary, music, and youth rooms by installing Aprilaire air purifiers on the furnaces that serve those areas
- The new cork flooring in fellowship hall had to be replaced because it was installed incorrectly. The contractor did the replacement at no cost to the church
- The flagpole and flag on the front sign were replaced
- A motion sensor light was installed to light the area between the parking lot and car port
- The Sundell's dropped our custodial contract. Rebecca Malke was hired to fill the position
- LED bulbs were installed in the parking lot lights
- New fans were installed in the sanctuary
- The deck was power washed and re-stained
- A locking mailbox was installed
- A leak in the fire sprinkler system was repaired

Future large expenditures we want to bring to your attention:

- Replace furnace #3, which serves the music room
- Parking lot replacement (using funds from the capital appeal campaign and Major Maintenance Fund and Endowment Fund)

We will also discover ways to make our homes more energy efficient.









Worship data—an Old Metric with a New Understanding

How many people are in worship each Sunday? For decades, the number of people in worship was the defining metric of the health of a congregation. However, we know the number of people in the United States who identify as Christian has been steadily decreasing² and Madison, Wisconsin ranks as the 11th most "post-Christian" city³ in the country. For years the United Church of Christ has been encouraging churches to change metrics and instead focus on our **ministries**, what we do to care for one another, as well as how we reach out to our community in response to God's love as the primary measures of church vitality. They have asked us to consider new questions: 1). How many people have we connected with this year *inside* the church building? 2). How many people have we touched... *outside the building*?

Annual Meeting Minutes January 31, 2021

(Note: Due to the COVID 19 pandemic, the meeting was held over the internet using the Zoom conferencing program. Steve Gorton, Chair of the Technology Committee and Jamie Gaffke, Church Administrator, served as 'virtual ushers' and documented that a quorum of the membership was participating on Zoom. Members voted electronically by way of a survey poll administered by Jamie Gaffke.)

Pastor Kris opened the meeting with a prayer.

Words from the President: Dean Baumgardner, Council President, welcomed everyone and provided instruction and guidance on how to vote on Zoom. Dean thanked members and friends for their continued good works, despite Covid-19, at Luke House, the crop walk, the Good Neighbors Personal Essentials Pantry, the Foundation for Black Women's Wellness and on many other social justice issues. We continue to "be the church" despite being physically distanced from each other.

Approval of the 2020 Annual Minutes: Jim Veloff moved, seconded by Jan Klawitter, to approve the January 26, 2020 annual meeting minutes. Motion approved.

Life of the Church: Pastor Kris provided a video look at "How it Started vs How It's Going Now" noting pre-COVID processes and current activities within the congregation's life with staff messages from Jeff Darwin, Jamie Gaffke, Rebecca Malke and Jonathan Schroerlucke on their ministries. Many thanks in Izzy Oebser and Pastor Kris for their work on producing this video!

Election of Council Members: Sonjia Short moved, seconded by Jan Klawitter, to elect John Rosch, Dean Baumgardner and Cathy Halpin to a second two-year Council term and Sue Webb to a third two-year term. Motion approved.

2021 Budget: Jon Boldebuck, Chair of Trustees, first thanked past Chairman Gary Johnson along with all of the Trustees for their hard work and extensive guidance throughout the past year. Jon introduced the 2021 budget proposal as a 'worst case' scenario. It projects 12 full months of expenses as if there were no Covid closures and also projects reduced income due to Covid closures. This results in a \$26,700 projected deficit in 2021. Trustees will keep the congregation updated at least quarterly on the budget during the year. John VanOverbeke responded to questions from the floor on administrative and secretarial salary and clarified some roll-ups of combined category totals. It was noted that funds raised for the Foundation for Black Women's Wellness initiative are 'pass-thru' funds separate from the operational budget. Also, the proposed budget does not include funding for

parking lot resurfacing this year. There are sufficient cash reserves to cover the deficit if necessary. Sonjia Short moved, seconded by Jan Klawitter, to approve the 2021 budget. Motion approved.

MUCC Covid-19 Response and Reopening Plan: John Rosch, Council Vice President, reminded us of Jesus's command "to love one another" as we continue to react to Covid. During 2020 Council with support from staff developed a detailed plan for reopening the building. While we are still in Stage 1 of the plan - no in-person, indoor groups - there is hope for improvement as we continue to monitor the situation, adhere to medical science and look forward to once again worshipping together in person. In the meantime...keep being the Church!

Foundation for Black Women's Wellness Initiative: Kaitlin Young thanked everyone for their generous financial support during the Advent/Epiphany campaign. Over \$15,000 was collected for this group, exceeding the goal of \$10,000. This is the first year of a five-year fund raising initiative that will be run each year during Advent and Epiphany.

Creation Justice Environmentally Friendly Products Initiative: Cindy Rosch invited anyone interested in joining a group on the subject to contact her. In addition, she updated the congregation on the UCC grant and matching Memorial funds used to purchase environmentally friendly products, such as laundry detergent, doggy poo bags and bar shampoo, to test and share with each other and the Personal Essential Pantry clients.
