Today After Worship: ZOOM CONVERSATIONS! Over the summer, on the first Sunday of the month, Pastor Kris has been hosting Fellowship with those who worship with us on Zoom. Bring your own coffee, milk and/or donuts! All you need to do is to stay "in" Zoom as the service ends (don't click "leave meeting").

Refreshments and Conversation: Today following worship, you are invited to stay for conversations and refreshments in the Fellowship Hall. Worship generally runs until around 10:30 a.m. or shortly after. Sunday School also runs until about 10:30 a.m. If the service goes over, students will rejoin you in worship. If it goes under, you are free to go to fellowship until Sunday School ends.

Memorial's COVID Protocols: With prayerful consideration of the health and wellness of the members and friends of the congregation our current **COVID protocols are**:

- Wearing a mask in the building is optional. Anyone may choose
 to wear a mask at any time. Please remember that some
 individuals wear a mask even if they are fully vaccinated. A face
 mask can be viewed as a sign of care and concern for oneself
 and others. Please respect people's choices and privacy. We
 have KN95 and medical masks available by the church office for
 those who wish to wear one.
- Masks are optional for Sunday School youth and teachers.
- Masks are also optional in the nursery area.

Hearing Loop and Listening Devices: For those who have hearing aids, Memorial UCC has a t-coil compatible hearing loop. Listening devices are also available for people who are hard-of-hearing. See an usher if you need assistance.

Bathrooms: There are two bathrooms near the main entrance of the church. A third, Gender Neutral and Accessible bathroom is in the hallway by the nursery. If you need assistance finding the restrooms, an usher will be happy to help you!
