MUCC Camping Trip at Wildcat Mountain State Park (WI) - July 7-9, 2023


Please sign up for our church camping trip! Contact Mary Koeppe either via email (koeppejm@gmail.com) or cell phone (608-698-4899). Arrive Friday afternoon/evening July 7 and depart home on Sunday afternoon July 9. We have group campsite C at Wildcat Mountain SP. This site allows campers and tents. The park ranger told me that there is a steep entrance into the park, with some curves, so a large camper may find it difficult to drive in. The site is limited to 15 vehicles (a vehicle + camper/trailer counts as 1 vehicle). The park ranger said that 15 campers will not fit on this site, so hopefully we will have a mix of tents and campers. When you sign up, please let me know how many people, tents (if tenting) or if you are coming with a camper (include size). The site allows up to 50 people.

On Saturday morning there will be a bicycle outing on the Elroy-Sparta rail trail which is close to the state park. There will be activities for kids as well.


